























Takeaway: The Big Butterfly Count



The Big Butterfly Count is a UK-wide survey which helps conservationists assess the health of the environment by inviting people all over the country to record the number and type of butterflies they see.

This year the project goes live on 1st July, ready for the main counting event between 14th July and 6th August 2023.

Why is counting butterflies helpful?

Butterflies are key biodiversity indicators for scientists because they react very quickly to changes in their environment. A fall in butterfly numbers shows that nature is in trouble - and having that information gives us the power to make positive change.

Debate: MK Transport

Despite efforts to encourage people to use their cars less, in Milton Keynes, over 80% of journeys to work are still made by car, and only 9% of journeys to work are made by bike or on foot!!

Work is currently underway to improve the situation by vastly improving the city's electric vehicle charging infrastructure and improve and expand the city's Redway network of off-road walking and cycling paths.



How else can the people of Milton Keynes be encouraged to use their cars less? Should ours be the first city in the UK to ban private cars altogether?


Groupwork: Milton Keynes City Guide

Is it for... people of your own age, older people; families travelling with pets; sports people; shopaholics; foodies; people with mobility challenges... or maybe The King!



Debate: Milton Keynes City Planning



Milton Keynes was designed in late 1960s by a team of idealistic architects, who had strong visions for a new way of living. Today the city is celebrated for its modernist designs, the grid system of its roads, and its abundance of parkland and green spaces.

A short film was made in 1973 during the planning and early building phase of the new town, where planner Fred Roach explains something of the architects' vision, and how it would pan out for the citizens of the new city.

Watch the film.

- "... we think Milton Keynes is the most exciting thing going on in Europe and perhaps the world..."
- "...one of the most encouraging things is the rich texture, not only physical form but in terms of the variety of people coming into the city ... and that's what this is about the diversity of it..."
- "... the sooner that people forget that the development agency existed, the sooner it means that the people who live in Milton Keynes have adopted their own city - that becomes their city..."



You live in the city of Milton Keynes now - over 53 years since it was first built.

Debate: Public Art




There are over 230 pieces of public art in Milton Keynes.

What is public art?


Public art is any kind of artwork that is situated in the public environment.

Often public art is made in response to a specific place, context, or event. A good example is 'Alphonso' by Sarah Staton - a sculptural folly made from handmade bricks that celebrates the site's former use as a brickworks.



Monuments, memorials, statues and sculptures are the most common forms of public art, but public art can also be temporary, for example when it takes the form of performance, dance, theatre, graffiti or street posters.

Some people think that public money is wasted on commissioning art. Others believe that art, and creative expression are important parts of human life, and that public art brings boring and mundane urban environments to life.





Group Work: Wes Andersen Meme



Wes Anderson is a film director whose strong visual style incorporates symmetry and a distinctive use of colour.

He often uses 'planimetric' composition - where the background seems flat in contrast to the character, who is placed in the centre of the foreground, directly facing the camera.

We didn't discover whether Wes Anderson has visited Milton Keynes, but we think - with its abundance of symmetry, that he would love it!



In April 2023 a new craze burst onto TikTok - people making videos of ordinary moments in their day - in the style of a Wes Anderson movie.

Groupwork: Time Capsule



Milton Keynes was founded in 1967, yet humans first settled in this area around 4000 years ago.



In 2000, two metal detectorists found an amazingly beautiful and ancient hoard of gold treasure in the muddy field that was to become Monkston Park. Now known as the Milton Keynes Hoard, the Bronze Age treasure reveals much about the Bronze Age people and how they lived.

Imagine you are an archaeologist of the future, looking for clues about life in this area, back in 2023.

Create a time capsule - an updated Milton Keynes Hoard - for the people of the future - that reflects something about life as you experience it today.

What items will it include?

toys, games, tools, ornaments, technologies diaries - receipts - newspapers - books

The container for the Milton Keynes Hoard was made from pottery known as Deverel-Rimbury. Some pieces of Deverel-Rimbury are decorated with delicate tools, others with finger marks.

Consider:


- > The container you use and what it will reveal to future people about now.
- > Where you will bury or hide it, and what clues to its whereabouts you will share?



Debate: Future of AI

Milton Keynes is famous for its forward-looking approach to city planning, technical development, architecture and innovation. In many ways is could be described as the archetypal city of the future.

The robot fair in September 2023, new advancements in robotics in the shopping centre, South Central - the new Institute of Technology in Bletchley and one of the most successful 3D printing companies in Europe, whose clients include Disney - are some of the examples of Milton Keynes' enthusiasm for innovation and technical advancement.



Yet - some people have expressed concern about the pace of technical advancement, particularly in relation to Artificial Intelligence - not just in Milton Keynes, but globally.

In March 2023, an open letter was published by the Future of Life Institute (FLI) calling for a pause in the development of AI, to allow time to consider what might be the unforeseen consequences, and to better understand the complexities of this new technology in relation to ethics, and legal frameworks.



>Should Milton Keynes continue to fully embrace new technology, or should we look back to the past for inspiration on how to make the world a better place for humans and non-human species alike?
